

SUBJECT: State and Local Coverage - Rhode Island Modification No. 54

COMMENTS: Cleared for approval.

A covering letter from the State dated November 30, 1964, applicable to this modification, indicates that the housing authority proposed for coverage herein is "subject" to the same State statutory provisions pursuant to which the Woonsocket Housing Authority -- covered in Modification No. 50 -- was established. As indicated in our comments re Modification No. 50, housing authorities created under the designated statutes appear to constitute a "political subdivision" of the State within the meaning of section 218(b)(2) of the Social Security Act and previously have been covered as such.
